Fire Department

We are quickly approaching National 2. Cooking fires: Stove burners, Fire Prevention Week. (Oct 8 – 14) During this time we aggressively concentrate on our students and their fire safety education. We would also like to take this time to remind you of your role in fire prevention. Your best protection from fires is to prevent them. These are just a few leading causes of home fires for you to consider.

1. Smoking materials: Careless use of smoking materials is the leading cause of fatal home fires. If ash trays. Always soak butts and ashes before dumping them in the wastebasket and never smoke in bed or when you are drowsy, intoxicated, or medicated. Keep matches and lighters up high, out of the reach of small children.

ovens, and microwaves can cause severe burns and start fires. The same is true of countertop appliances such as toasters, coffee makers, and toaster ovens. Never leave cooking unattended, keep your stove top clean, turn pot handles inward, and never store combustibles, such as paper bags, near a stove where they could catch fire

3. Heating appliances: Be sure all space heaters in your home bear the label of an independent testing you smoke, use heavy, large, non-tip laboratory. Keep all combustibles at least three feet away from stoves, fireplaces, portable heaters and space heaters. Remember to keep your fireplace fires small and always use a fire screen to prevent sparks from fling and hope you have a happy and safe into the room. Have your chimney inspected once a year.

4. Candles: Alarmingly, statistics show that candle fires are one of the few types of home fires that have increased over the last decade. Never leave a candle burning unattended. and never leave a child alone with an open flame --- even briefly. Always extinguish candles when you leave the room or go to sleep.

These are just a few of the many hazards that we should be mindful of. If you would like more printed information on fire prevention and survival, please contact the fire department. We also provide home fire inspections and can recommend safety tips such as recommended smoke alarm locations and exit drills. We are proud to serve our community holiday season.

Police Department



There were thirteen larcenies in September and eight of the thirteen involved auto burglaries. In the eight auto burglaries, all of the cars had been left unlocked with purses, laptops, and other property left inside the vehicle. We continue to attempt to alert the public about leaving their vehicles unlocked with valuables left inside. Not only is the vehicle owner being victimized but the stolen money, credit cards and other valuables are being used by gang members to buy or trade for drugs, weapons and ammunition that will then be used to victimize others.

There were also two burglaries and an attempted burglary reported on Sunday, September 17th at approximately noon. The State Fair was in town and many of our residents were at church or at the Fair. The one suspect who was seen may have been a gypsy. The attempted burglary was prevented by the alarm system being activated when the burglar broke a window at the rear of the residence. Alarm systems are extremely important and highly recommended.

We are currently involved in attempting to hire police officers to fill the two vacancies created by the loss of Officer Stroh and Officer Davis. The positions should be filled by the end of Oc- hire within the next few weeks. tober.
